Questions to get you thinking

- 1. Look at the instructions for husbands and wives in 3:18-19. What do they imply are the weaknesses that husbands and wives are liable to slip into? If you are married do you need to make any adjustments here?
- 2. What can we learn from 3:20-21 about attitudes between parents and children?
- 3. Slavery is not a feature of our society today. But how can Paul's instructions in 3:22-25 be applied to relations in the workplace?
- 4. For the average worker today, what is the main motivation for working hard? What, by contrast, is to be our own motivation? Would your own boss consider you a good worker?
- 5. Who is the boss we are really working for (3:23-24)? What difference should that make?
- 6. In what practical ways could a Christian employer show himself 'right and fair' (4:1) in the treatment of his staff?
- 7. What has 'being watchful' (4:2) got to do with prayer?
- 8. The word 'mystery' reappears in 4:3. Do you recall from its earlier appearances (1:26; 1:27; 2:2) what it means? If you get stuck, look back to the question sheet for Session 4.
- 9. Give examples of what it might mean to be 'wise in the way you act towards outsiders' (4:5).
- 10. What do you think it means to be 'salty' in our conversation (4:6)?
